



Plant Swap Anyone? - Popular in Oviedo

Do you have a green thumb? Do your plants have babies that need to be thinned, but you hate to just throw them away? Maybe you are new to growing plants and don't know where to start? You should consider joining a Plant Swap group.



I joined the new Plant Swap of Oviedo on Facebook last fall. Now, there are more than 400 members who are happy to share and eager to receive plants. At the in-person swap about 8-15 people gather one Saturday a month at The Rail in Oviedo, near The Town House. There you will find cuttings to be rooted, saplings, seedlings, seeds, and more. Written care instructions are supposed to be included. It is also allowable to offer a gallon bag of soil for trade. You are free to accept or decline any offer, if you are not interested or if you don't think it's a fair trade. Many people bring more than enough cuttings to give away without worrying about a trade. There are houseplants

and outdoor plants.

Another way to swap is to do a porch trade. You post what you have to trade on the Facebook page, then someone will say they have always wanted that and tell you what they have to trade. Just work out a time to leave it on the porch for a pickup or meet somewhere in between to swap. Sometimes a member may post a request for something rare hoping that one of the members will see it and offer a baby plant that they have.

Some swappers are only interested in edibles; others prefer only succulents, still others are

looking for rare treasures, most are thrilled to get anything new. I always come home with more than I gave away. I have upgraded the landscape around my home for free! It is a fun way to meet new friends and learn about new kinds of plants. If this sounds intriguing, you can google plant swap in Orlando and look for a group in your area. The Oviedo group is open to new members if you are in this area. Look for Plant Swap of Oviedo on Facebook to learn more.





No One Would Believe It! By: Beth Barnes

My idea of camping was always a Holiday Inn at the minimum, so I don't quite know how I got into this situation but here I was with my husband about to buy an RV. "But we're not RV people," I moaned. "We're not old enough." "You're allergic to mosquitoes." "We don't play shuffleboard." "I don't like to ride long distances." "You don't like tuna fish casserole." Nothing I said made any difference. And so, we bought a used 27 ft. Winnebago motor home and off we went on our first camping trip--to Disney's Ft. Wilderness Campground. What a mistake!!

Have you ever been to Ft. Wilderness Campground? Mosquitoes are not allowed. There's not a pine needle out of place. Every site is level with a huge concrete pad that elves have scrubbed spotless. There are trees everywhere (I didn't know then what I know now about the importance of trees for shade)—and the branches have been trimmed so they don't scrape the air conditioner off the roof of the RV. The roads are paved. Every premium site has full hookups and everything works. Plus, they offer transportation, sing-alongs, a camp store, swimming pools, a beach, restaurants, golf carts, horses, bicycles, etc., etc., etc.! Needless to say, we had a marvelous time and left with great expectations, but NO CAMPGROUND HAS EVER MEASURED UP TO THAT SINCE.

And then we went to Jetty Park on the coast. Our site was on a sandy, uneven, no-treed lot wedged right up to the next site, in full sun, in 90 degree weather. We went from the sublime to the ridiculous. Even worse, our RV faced south, which meant that we got full western sun on our outside sitting area. Remember that, future RVers. But, despite the heat and the bugs and the noise and the crowded conditions, there was the Atlantic and the beach, and we had our folding chairs and a glass of wine, and we were AWAY.

For our next trip, we choose Lake Greenwood State Park in northwestern South Carolina, which sent us on interstates and small, narrow hilly country roads. Needless to say, John learned a lot about driving an RV. That state park campground has overhanging boughs, poor water pressure, and uneven, unpaved sites, but it's on a huge, beautiful,

clean, swimmable lake, with no alligators that I could see and well-behaved water moccasins. Because we didn't tow a car, our intention was to rent one, but there was no car rental agency anywhere near that would deliver a car and we didn't want to unhook everything to drive the RV to get one. Apparently, we were stuck and weren't going sightseeing in the area. No matter, we had brought the jet ski, and we found that we could get around on the water just fine--all three of us, John, Biscuit and me. Biscuit's not much for swimming, but she LOVES to ride on the jet ski. People standing on the shore would point and wave as we rode by. I guess they'd never seen a dog on a personal watercraft.

We took the Winnebago to a number of state parks in Florida, which are almost always a good place to camp and the sites are half-price if you're over 65. We camped at Ft. Clinch State Park on the Atlantic near the Florida-Georgia line and explored the fort there, which is furnished as it might have been when it was occupied during the Civil War. We camped at Sebastian Inlet State Park, where we visited a museum of items recovered from the

many shipwrecks along the Florida Coast. We walked to the inlet and could immediately understand why it's so dangerous for recreational boaters: the water rushes furiously in and out of the narrow opening with the tides. However, there's a cove there where the water is calm and clear and it's a delightful place to swim. At Christmas, we camped at

Suwannee River State Park, and we camped at Ft. DeSoto County Park in Pinellas County and in other state parks in Florida. Just remember that you must book most state and county parks months ahead.

Along the way, though, after that first year, we decided that our RV was too small and, of course, we went larger and fancier and ordered a Tiffin from Lazy Days RV Superstore in Tampa.

We've been numerous places in our Tiffin in the three years since we bought it, and I'll mention a couple. We drove from Orlando to South Dakota, and I'll have to say that the trip did not get off on the best foot. First, we lost hours because of a wreck on I-95 near Gainesville and second, my husband does not like to make reservations. I could tell you stories!

True to form, he had not made plans for our first night on the road and WE COULD NOT FIND ANY PLACE TO STAY! It was dark. We could find nothing—not the first sign saying "Campsites," "KOA," or "Campers Welcome." Nothing. We were still fairly new at this RV-ing business and I was still nervous about basics like where are we going to park for the night. However, thanks to a very kind supermarket manager, we ended up sleeping by the highway in the tiny parking lot of a Bi-Lo in an Alabama town that I couldn't find on a map.

Later, we learned to look on an app called Allstays for a WalMart SuperCenter. You need to know about WalMarts and RVs: we all stay overnight in their parking lots—for free. That's better than paying \$50-\$90 per night at a KOA and certainly better than many of the RV camps that have residential campers. (Ask me about those places.) If you call the manager of a supercenter and ask nicely, most will let you park way over to the side of the parking lot *for one night*. Most motor homes are self -contained and nobody wants to go to the trouble to hookup electricity, sewer, and water for one night at a campsite, anyway.

After that night, we drove through Alabama and then Mississippi to Oxford, where we went to the very famous Square Books (I spent way too much money!) and drove the Ole Miss campus, spent the night at WalMart, then went on Tupelo, where Elvis and I were born, and to Memphis where I grew up and he became famous. We had a scare at a low overpass just before the bridge over the Mississippi River--low overpasses can peel back the roof of an RV. But, we had both taken an RV driving class

When we pull into a gas station, we have to ask ourselves if we will clear the awning, whether the front of the RV or the end of the car will stick out too far into traffic, if we can get out safely without hitting parked cars or having to back up. We also learned that it's best to find the most economical driving speed and stick to it, to stay in the slow lane and let other cars worry about passing us, when to initiate turns to avoid running over sidewalks or cars—or people, how to use dots on a windshield to determine our place in a highway lane, etc. But, the class did not prepare us for our two worst experiences: pulling off without unhooking from the electrical box and the front tire blowout we had on I-75 coming back from camping near Naples. By then, though, John was a pro RV wrangler and steered us to safety on the shoulder of the highway. But, I digress.

The Dakota trip was without incident, except for a flooded KOA, which made it difficult to walk the dog. We stopped in Sioux Falls and at the Corn Palace and the famous Wall Drug Store. We saw rolling plains of yellow grass and I expected Kevin Costner to come riding by any minute. We made Rapid City, SD, our home base and from there drove through the hauntingly beautiful Badlands where most of the cowboy movies of our youth were filmed. We went to the Black Hills and Mt. Rushmore, to Sturgis where the motorcyclists gather [and catch Covid], saw a huge herd of bison, one of which was close enough to touch for me to touch [I didn't], and to Deadwood where Calamity Jane and Wild Bill Hickok are buried. I flew home after three weeks, which was always my plan, and John and Biscuit continued on to Wyoming and North Dakota. He has quite a story about a 90 mile stretch of 2-lane highway with no gas stations, rest stops, or places to pull over. They meandered home three weeks later.
