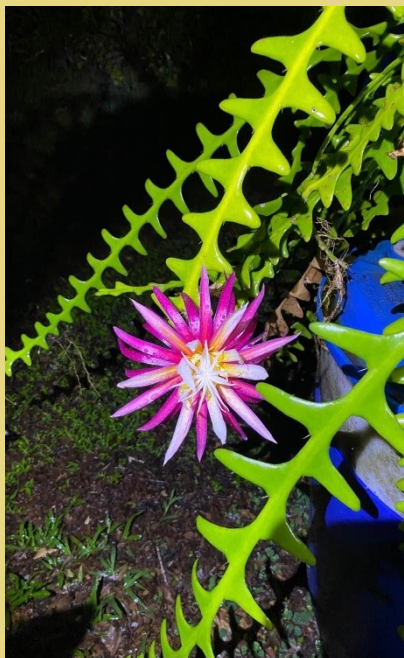

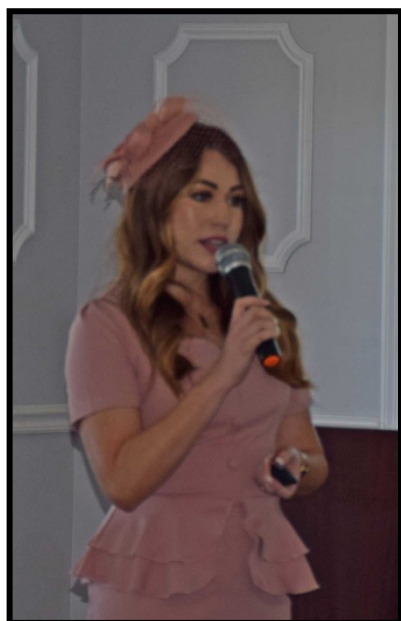

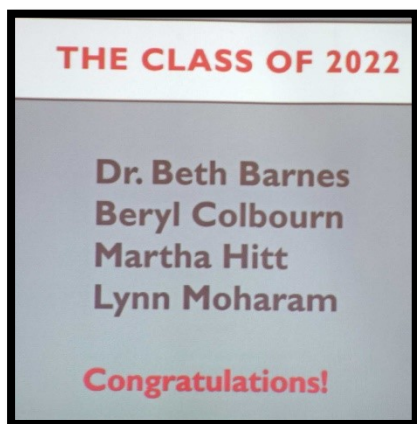
Courtney Lee, a UCF student, shared with us her personal story and passion for participating in PedsAcademy program and supporting its special mission.

Sisterhood is Powerful

I was never a nun and I had only two younger brothers. I never had sisters. There were the Sisters, with a capital S, in my sorority the one year I spent at FSU, and a few friends with whom I have remained very close since our undergraduate days at USF, but my membership in the Women's Club at UCF has allowed me to be part of an entire network of friends. Women's friendships are like a sisterhood. And, sisterhood is powerful.

When I was a young English professor in the early days of FTU, now UCF, our dear Frances Millican would call me monthly, sometimes more frequently, and urge me to join the Faculty Wives Club. But I got my back up because I was a faculty member, not a faculty wife, and I always refused her. You must understand that I had worked very hard as a single mom to become a faculty member and, at the time, it was a distinction that made a difference to me. That request, by the way, was the only thing I ever dared refuse Frances Millican, and what a mistake that was! Because when I did join the group, I began to realize what I had missed: this is a very special organization, and I want you to know and experience just how special.

A few years ago, after I had retired from the university and become president of the Women's Club, we did a search to see what other university women's clubs offered their members. We found that most had a luncheon a couple of times a year and some raised money for the institution, but that virtually *none* of them offered interest groups to their membership.

We would be a substantially different club if we didn't join together variously to Take a Hike, share Gourmet meals, watch Chick Flicks, do Needlework together, walk on Monday morning, play Canasta or Maj Jong, make International Friendships, go to the Theatre, or participate in the many other interest groups available to us. These groups of women with common interests are what makes our club so very special--they are at the very core of our club--and they allow us to form bonds of friendship that run run deep and last long.

They allow each of us to develop a network of sisters--and, well, one brother. I have to tell you about our brother. Marian Bolte was honored with a posthumous membership in the Women's Club Hall of Fame last year. Her husband, Dr. John Bolte, had continued to pay her dues long after they moved to Oregon, after she had to enter a nursing home, and even after she passed away. When he asked if he could be a special member of the Searchers genealogy group, we said,

"Absolutely! Of course! Welcome brother."

As I was saying, it is these interest groups that allow us to develop a network of sisters who are with us in times of joy and of sorrow, who rally behind us as necessary, who serve as our back-ups, safety nets, our shrinks; who shop and cook for us, send us cards, drive us where we need to go, party with us, challenge and inspire us; who are occasionally our personal press agents--and who sometimes make us wish we had been only children! Because women's friendships are like a sisterhood.

It is also true that both formally in an event like our Chocolate Fantasy, Clothing Sale, or Putting on the Glitz--or simply with our individual checkbooks, we support the mission of this incredible university by offering scholarships to deserving graduates and undergraduates. But, this work for UCF is made so much more meaningful to us when we do it in common cause with our Women's Club sisters.

Because, as I said, Sisterhood is Powerful. If you don't believe me, back off. We've got sisters and we're not afraid to use them!

Canine Companions

A neighbor recently pulled her car up to me as I finished my morning walk. She rolled down her window, leaned out, and said, “you look naked without a dog!” It’s true that nearly every day, twice a day, I’m found walking with a four-legged puppy with a blue and gold vest. These dogs are from Canine Companions (canine.org), the national non-profit organization that enhances the lives of people with disabilities by providing expertly trained service dogs at no charge to the recipient. I am a volunteer puppy raiser and my sixth puppy Zachariah just completed Advanced Training (with our professional trainers) and is going into the match process early this month. I dearly hope he finds the person he can help. The client may have cerebral palsy, multiple sclerosis, hearing loss, stroke, development delays, or be a veteran experiencing PTSD.

My puppies and I attend classes with many students from UCF. In fact, our university is home to the largest Canine Companions collegiate puppy raising program in the country — **STEP@UCF, the Service--Dog Training and Education Program.**

STEP@UCF seeks to educate our campus, as well as the general public, about the impact of service dogs and to spread awareness of service dog etiquette and respect. The UCF campus is a wonderful learning ground for our pups with new sights, smells, and distractions galore. And the students have raised over 40 dogs for the program!

Many people asked us, “how can you give them up?” It’s true that we fall in love with the little 2-month old labs, Golden Retrievers, or crosses the minute they are in our arms. But as we train them in 30-commands, socialize them at Publix or Target, and practice good manners at restaurants, we are always focused on the goal of handing the leash over to the client at a beautiful graduation ceremony.

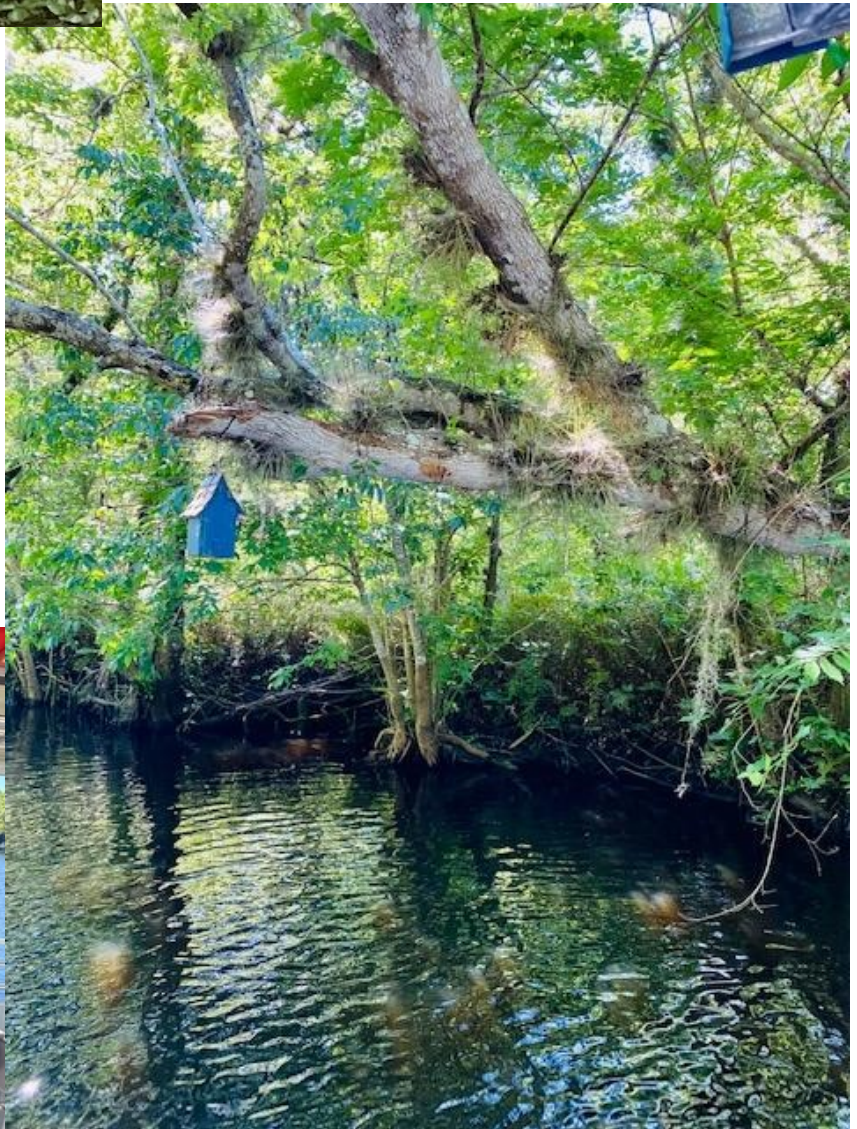

To Bee or Not To Bee!

Are you looking for a new hobby to start this spring/summer? Are you looking for something exciting, unique, challenging, yet rewarding? Well, why not try beekeeping?! I recently started this fun venture for myself and love it!

I have always been fascinated with bees.... their ability to work together in harmony and precision, all while helping to keep the ecosystem in check. I never really had the desire to interact with bees, let alone oversee a beehive, but after attending a local workshop at the Black Hammock Bee Farms last year, I walked away with a whole new appreciation and respect for bees... especially honeybees. I also learned that there was a genuine concern for the decline of honeybees in this country and a need to increase their population.



I had seen an ad a few years earlier for a new kind of hive that was easier to maintain, less messy when extracting the honey, and minimally disruptive to the bees. It was called a FlowHive. Well, when I received one this last Christmas I was ecstatic and couldn't wait to get started!! The nice thing about Black Hammock Bee Farms is they'll deliver a 'nuc' right to you and transition it into their new home. A bee nuc is a small colony of appx 10,000 bees including the queen.



(By the way, did I mention I'm a 'honey-holic'? If I could get this hive going strong, I was thinking of all the money I'd be saving. If you only knew how quickly I go through Costco containers of honey you'd understand!)

Well after patiently waiting until Spring to receive my new colony, I can finally say I'm an official beekeeper. It's only been a month and the bees are thriving in their new home.

And I can also say, after handling the bees several times now, that I haven't been stung yet (where's that wood to knock on?). Hopefully, within a couple of months I'll be able to start extracting some honey. But for now, I'm enjoying learning about and watching these wonderful creations God gave us!

HERE ARE A FEW FUN FACTS:

- * All bee types are determined by the size of the cell created. The queen will choose to fertilize the egg or not before laying an egg in the cell. Fertilized will be female, unfertilized will be males.
- * The diet of the larvae determines whether the bee will be a worker or a queen. Queen larvae are fed royal jelly only.
- * Queen bees can live 2-7 years and will lay appx 1500 a day! Worker bees live appx 40 days.
- * Drone bees are male bees whose only role is to mate with virgin queen bees. They die shortly after.



- * It's best not to wear dark clothing when near a hive. Brown and black bears are natural enemies of bees and you might alarm them.
- * Worker bees die immediately after stinging. Queens, however, do not have a barbed stinger and can sting repeatedly without dying.
- * For bees to produce 1 lb of wax, they must consume 11 lbs of nectar or honey.
- * Beekeeping requires little space. Urban beekeepers with limited yard space often place hives on rooftops and balconies.
